

When they neared Jerusalem, having arrived at Bethphage on Mount Olives, Jesus sent two disciples with these instructions: "Go over to the village across from you. You'll find a donkey tethered there, her colt with her. Untie her and bring them to me. If anyone asks what you're doing, say, 'The Master needs them!' He will send them with you."

This is the full story of what was sketched earlier by the prophet: Tell Zion's daughter, "Look, your king's on his way, poised and ready, mounted On a donkey, on a colt, foal of a pack animal."

The disciples went and did exactly what Jesus told them to do. They led the donkey and colt out, laid some of their clothes on them, and Jesus mounted. Nearly all the people in the crowd threw their garments down on the road, giving him a royal welcome. Others cut branches from the trees and threw them down as a welcome mat. Crowds went ahead and crowds followed, all of them calling out, "Hosanna to David's son!" "Blessed is he who comes in God's name!" "Hosanna in highest heaven!"

As he made his entrance into Jerusalem, the whole city was shaken. Unnerved, people were asking, "What's going on here? Who is this?"

The parade crowd answered, "This is the prophet Jesus, the one from Nazareth in Galilee."

While his disciples were eating with him at supper, Jesus took a piece of bread in his hands, like this, and he blessed it praying in the tradition of his forebears:

"Blessed are you Lord God of all creation; through your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made."

And then he said to them: "This is my body broken for you, (break loaf) do this is in remembrance of me."

It will become for us the bread of life.

And then Jesus took a cup of wine, like this, and gave thanks to God in the traditional way of his ancestors:

"Blessed are you Lord God of all creation, through your goodness we have this wine to offer, fruit of the vine and work of human hands." (Pour from pitcher into chalice) And then he said to them: "Drink this, all of you, for this represents my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this in remembrance of me."

It will become for us the cup of salvation.

Lord Jesus Christ, as we do in this place what you did once and for all long ago in Jerusalem, breathe again your Holy Spirit upon us and upon this bread and wine. May they be for us as heaven's food, renewing, transforming, sustaining and making us whole, so that we may be your body on earth, loving and caring for your creation; where all are welcome and the poorest are fed. Bless the earth, heal the sick, let the oppressed go free, and fill each one of us with your love from on high. Amen

Exodus 2:11-15

One day, after Moses had grown up, he went out to his people and saw their forced labor. He saw an Egyptian beating a Hebrew, one of his kinsfolk. He looked this way and that, and seeing no one he killed the Egyptian and hid him in the sand. When he went out the next day, he saw two Hebrews fighting; and he said to the one who was in the wrong, "Why do you strike your fellow Hebrew?" He answered, "Who made you a ruler and judge over us? Do you mean to kill me as you killed the Egyptian?" Then Moses was afraid and thought, "Surely the thing is known." When Pharaoh heard of it, he sought to kill Moses.

But Moses fled from Pharaoh. He settled in the land of Midian, and sat down by a well.

Exodus 3:1-8a

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the LORD appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." When the LORD saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." He said further, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.




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Theodulph of Orléans, 9th century Transl. John Mason Neale, 1854; alt. Matt. 21:8-9



Brought to France by Charlemagne, Theodulph became bishop of Orléans but was later imprisoned by Charlemagne's successor. The simple, formulaic nature of this song makes it especially suitable for use during the communion portion of the Lord's Supper. Because it can be learned readily and does not require reference to a printed source, it frees people to sing before and after receiving the elements.

This anonymous folk hymn, with its modal (dorian) tune, has appeared in many versions. William Walker, compiler of Southern Harmony, one of the most important nineteenth-century tune books in the United States, lived and died in Spartanburg, South Carolina.
